





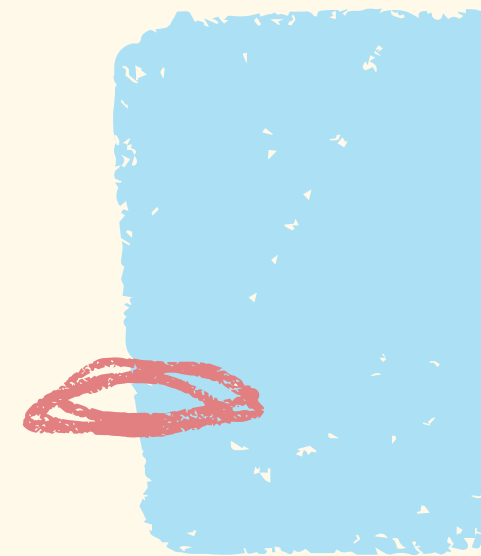
A Family Conversation Card Set

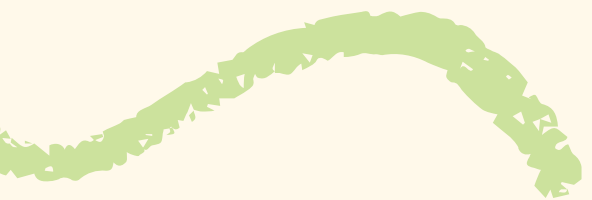

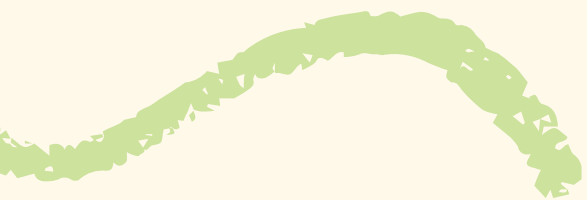

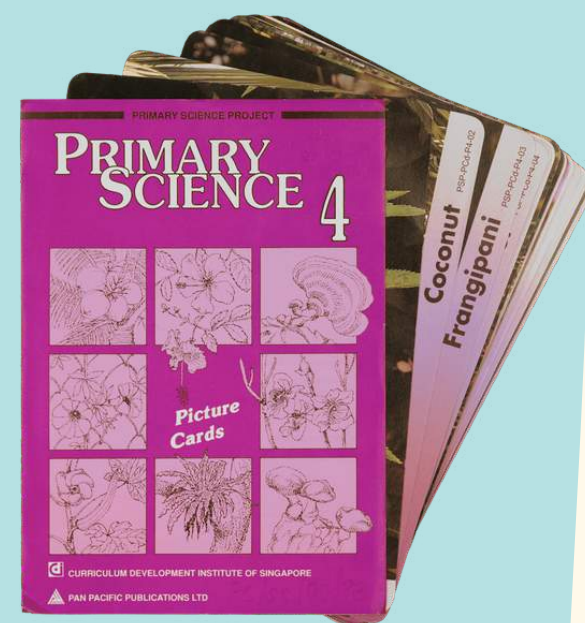


Lesson Time

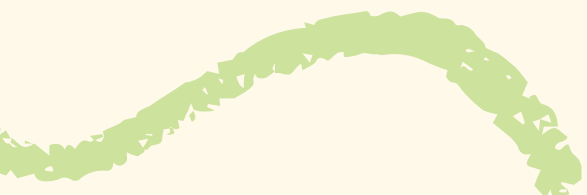

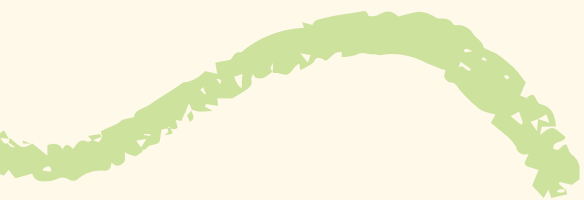

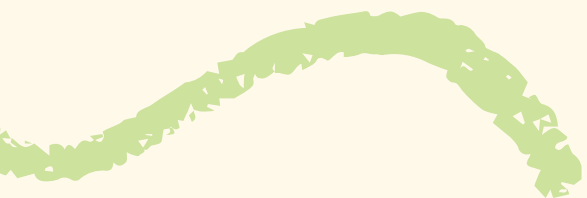

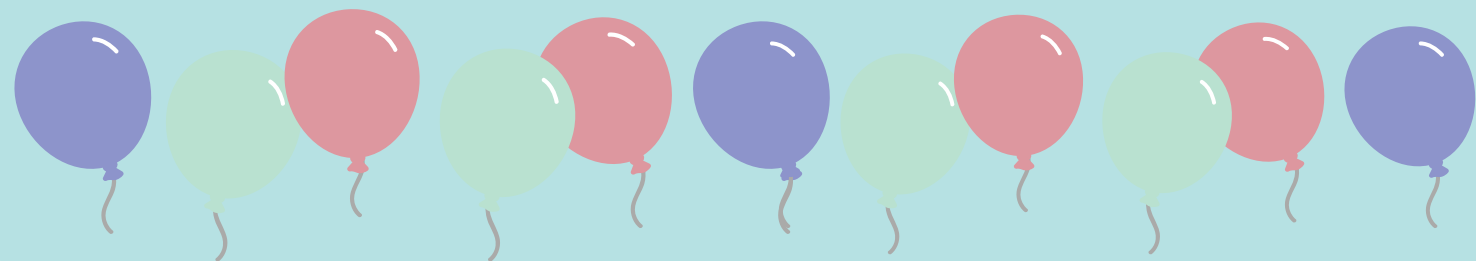


Celebrations

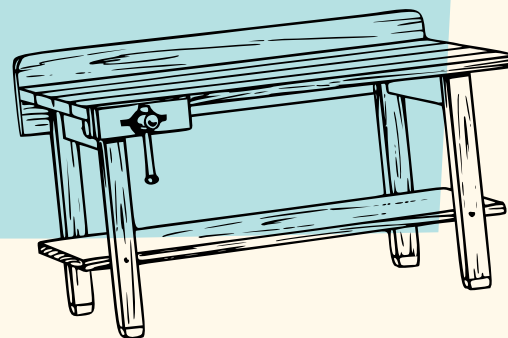
